

# KAIROS in Action

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*Beginning in April 2009, KAIROS staff began implementing the decisions of a re-mandating and re-structuring process initiated by the Board in the fall of 2008. Beginning April 22, 2009, KAIROS refocused its programmatic work around two thematic areas— Sustainability and Dignity and Rights. Staff moved into revised job positions in these two thematic teams and an additional outreach team. The restructuring resulted in layoffs in five positions and the creation of two new positions. A strategic planning process (2010-2015) has now begun which will give more specific direction within these broad program theme areas. While this significant restructuring was unfolding, our program work continued...*

From June 17-20, 2009 the KAIROS community gathered in an inspiring and dynamic event at the University of Waterloo. Inuit leader Shelia Watt Cloutier, biblical theologian Ched

Myers, Filipina ecumenical leader Sharon Ruiz Duremdes and many others challenged the participants to strengthen their efforts in faith inspired social justice. Close to 50 young adults attended this event bringing their energy and enthusiasm for the work of justice. The event was preceded by a special session for the anti-poverty networks and was followed by a migrant justice forum. ## Sustainability: Promoting Energy Justice



In May of 2009, KAIROS took a delegation of seventeen church leaders, activists, global partners and staff members to Athabasca Tar Sands where the industry has dramatically altered ecosystems and economies, and continues to grow at a startling rate despite the recent economic downturn. The effects are felt on Indigenous groups, local communities, and workers.

The delegation listened attentively to churches, community groups, Indigenous communities, government and industry and prepared a final statement. KAIROS has also developed a series of related digital resources:

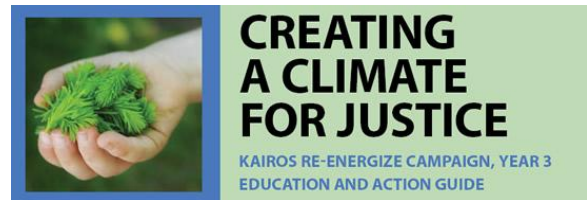

On June 27 and 28th, KAIROS staff participated in a World Council of Churches' (WCC) forum on Ecological Debt and contributed to a statement approved by the WCC's Central Committee. The statement advances the position that the ecological crisis which the world is facing has been induced largely by the consumerist cultures of the Northern industrial countries. It challenges the commodification of the earth as only "natural resources" to be exploited for profit. Further, the statement acknowledges the ecological debt that the North owes to the peoples of the South for the historical and present plundering of both their land and atmospheric commons. The WCC statement calls for action on the part of each of its member churches to advocate on behalf of climate justice by insisting that their governments adopt a fair and binding agreement at the UN negotiations on climate change when they meet in Copenhagen in December 2009. Canadian church people continued to engage in the **Re-energize Campaign**, this year by signing the Kyoto Plus Petition. To support the petition signatures leading up to Copenhagen, and year long action on climate justice, we have developed the following educational resources:

## Dignity and Rights



KAIROS continues its solidarity with global partners in our focus countries. On August 31st, we issued an urgent appeal for the release of Golden Misabiko, the 53-year-old President



of the Katangan branch of the Association africaine de defense des droits de l'homme, ASADHO-Katanga, a respected Congolese human rights organization.

Misabiko was arrested on 24 July and charged with "threatening state security" because his organization published a report alleging state complicity in illegal mining at a uranium mine in Katanga province, Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), a controversial mine that critics claim is polluting the air and water of the region. In August, KAIROS also expressed concerns about the arrest of a peaceful Palestinian activist. Mohammed Al-Khatib was arrested after travelling to Canada to raise awareness of the effects of the occupation on his west Bank Village of Bil'in. In June the village launched a lawsuit against a Canadian company involved in building Israeli-only settlements on the village's lands. Bil'in holds peaceful protests as well as non-violent attempts to reach village lands cut off by the Israeli Separation Wall. We continue to work with our partners in Colombia as they raise concerns about the Canada-Colombia Free Trade Agreement (CCFTA). Canadian grassroots actions in the spring and summer strengthened opposition to the agreement. There was a partial victory in parliament when the Liberal Party called for a human rights impact assessment (HRIA) before ratifying the deal. Recent reports are that the government of Canada has notched the CCFTA down on the order paper, which means that it may come back up for debate later in the fall. Bill C-23 (the number given to the CCFTA) was expected to go to a vote early in this session

of parliament. The second reading, or at least part of it, took place in September but thanks to people's calls and letters to MPs, the vote did not go ahead.

Murders and threats continue unabated in Colombia such as the 2009 deaths of six Protestant church leaders from the province of Córdoba. In that province alone in 2008 there were 512 violent deaths, including six massacres. This is the highest murder rate in the past 18 years. Out of concern for regional destabilization in Latin America, and informed by our regional partner CLAI (the Latin American Council of Churches), KAIROS also issued an urgent action regarding human rights violations in Honduras following the coup.



At home, KAIROS is supporting the 4<sup>th</sup> annual Sisters in Spirit Vigils (October 4) to draw attention to the more than 500 Aboriginal women across Canada who are missing or have been murdered. In this work we join together with Amnesty International, KAIROS, the National Association of Friendship Centres, the Canadian Federation of Students and the Native Women's Association of Canada.
