Most of the world's coffee is grown by some of the poorest people on the planet. Small landowners and farmers in places like Colombia, Indonesia, Guatemala, and Mexico subsidize Canadian's morning habit through the decreasing price of coffee on the world market. They can't do this forever.

Fair trade coffee offers farmers in these countries a better livelihood by encouraging direct access to markets and paying a better price for their coffee. If the large coffee chains would offer Canadians the choice of a fairly traded cup of joe, Canadians could feel even better after their morning jolt of caffeine.

Facts

- Coffee is the world's most valuable trading commodity after oil.
- ❖ 25 million small producers around the world rely on coffee for a living and there are over 500 billion cups of coffee consumed every year.
- ❖ The World Bank estimates that between 2000 and 2002, over 600,000 workers in the coffee industry lost their jobs in Central America alone due to dwindling prices.
