We continue to hear from Parliamentarians, government officials, and partner agencies that KAIROS' voice carries influence because of the weight of many faithful voices united together. Celebrating the KAIROS Blanket Exercise's 25th anniversary with the first World KAIROS Blanket Exercise

In 2022, KAIROS marked 25 years of the KAIROS Blanket Exercise (KBE), a powerful and essential tool for fostering right relations with Indigenous peoples across Canada and globally.

KAIROS celebrated this milestone by holding the **first World KBE at the World Indigenous Peoples Conference on Education in Adelaide, Australia,** on September 28, 2022. KBE Global and Newcomer Coordinator, Alfredo Barahona helped facilitate this KBE with Gloria Gonzalez, a Maya Achi woman from Guatemala, and Dario Iza, President of the Kitu Kara Nation from Ecuador.

Launching a new path forward

The KBE's 25th anniversary was a moment to celebrate its achievements, address challenges and chart a path forward in a good way. After experiencing remarkable growth, KAIROS decided to pause new KBE bookings to develop strategic improvements for a more robust program, one that would center Indigenous voices to sustain its powerful impact in fostering understanding, reconciliation, and meaningful change. In the summer of 2023, we consulted with the KAIROS community through three in-person and virtual forums. The team presented a draft KBE Framework with the KAIROS Indigenous Rights Circle, partners, facilitators, and broader Indigenous communities. The team has worked tirelessly to ensure that the new program's framework - which is Indigenous-led, partner-driven and administered by KAIROS - is fully developed and ready for implementation.

Supporting the Sixties Scoop Network



In 2022, the <u>Sixties Scoop Network (</u>SSN), in collaboration with KAIROS Canada, successfully secured funding from the Sixties Scoop Healing Foundation. This funding further supported the **Bigwen 60s Scoop Healing Initiatives and Debwewin In our own Words:**

Mapping the 60s Scoop Diaspora

project. These were vital healing and cultural initiatives for Sixties Scoop survivors and their families. SSN organized a fall 60s Scoop gathering for survivors along with cultural, training and healing opportunities in 2023. On National Indigenous Peoples Day in 2023, SSN released 12 groundbreaking in-depth <u>video interviews</u> with Sixties Scoop survivors, part of the Debwewin In our own Words project. In addition to securing funding for the Sixties Scoop Network, KAIROS offered administrative support for this project.

In partner solidarity

KAIROS supported long-term solidarity partners in Ecuador, Guatemala, Mexico, Colombia, Kenya, Ghana, South Africa, Philippines, Israel and Palestine.

These global partners ground and inform KAIROS' advocacy work on human rights, ecological and climate justice, corporate accountability, gender justice and peace.

These partnerships are about solidarity, relationships, advocacy and education. The small grants that we provide are critical and tangible expressions of our solidarity and allow partners to do vital work.

Investment in women peacebuilders is paying off!

In the early fall of 2023, KAIROS and its **Women of Courage: Women**, **Peace and Security Program** partners delivered a message to Canadians and Parliamentarians: "Canada's investment in women-led grassroots organizations in the Global South is paying off."

The sixth and final year into this program, it was evident through the numbers of Stories of Change that its Theory of Change was working:

When women survivors of war and violence are provided with psychosocial, legal support and accompaniment, and human rights training, they become active peacebuilders, human rights defenders and environmental activists.

A year prior, partners also noticed that their emerging work with male allies was becoming an innovative, effective, and celebrated part of the program.

In 2018, Global Affairs Canada approved funding for this program, providing \$4.5 million over six years to support the work of grassroots women-led organizations. This funding was made possible with matching funds from KAIROS' member churches and agencies, religious communities, individual donors, labour unions and other supporters.

The partners represent the essence of hope in action, and their impact on their communities has been remarkable. They are: Héritiers de la Justice (HJ), DRC; Organización Femenina Popular (OFP), Colombia; South Sudan Council of Churches (SSCC), National Women's Programme; and Wi'am: the Palestinian Conflict Transformation Centre (Wi'am), Palestine.

"Through this programming, I have discovered how powerful and strong I am. I have learned to contribute outside of my family and to make my voice heard, and now teach my daughters to be strong and independent and my son to be respectful and honourable. We meet again!

South-South gatherings and exchanges are a pillar of KAIROS' WPS program, allowing partners to exchange experiences and knowledge, develop strategies and build common cause. While we embraced digital tools to connect during the pandemic, we were also excited to gather in person when restrictions were lifted for more meaningful exchanges. During the first half of 2023, KAIROS staff visited and met with all WPS partners in Colombia, South Sudan and West Bank. Because we were not able to attain visas for the DRC, we met with HJ staff in Kigali, Rwanda. The South-South exchange between the OFP and Wi'am in Colombia and the West Bank was planned for November 2023. Due to the violence in Palestine and Israel, the exchange occurred between KAIROS and the OFP.

WPS partners visited KAIROS network and Parliamentarians in the fall of 2023

KAIROS' WPS partners visited Canada from September 25 to October 6, 2023 to share the program's success. During the visit, titled **Climate, Conflict, Gender: KAIROS Canada's Women of Courage Visit 2023**, the partners met with KAIROS donors, network and government officials in Toronto, Kelowna, Winnipeg, Ottawa, Montreal, and Sydney (NS). They shared their learnings, experiences and strategies, while celebrating the program's significant outcomes.

In Ottawa, delegates had fruitful meetings with Parliamentarians, Global Affairs officials, and the WPS Ambassador, and were greeted by the Minister of International Development.

The public events, held by the partners during the Eastern, Western and Ottawa tour groups, collectively gathered more than 100 allies and members of the public. "We had amazing conversations with community leaders - the partners had a LOT of wisdom to share," said Alison Etter, Sydney. Debby Dandy with the Winnipeg team said, "Having a personal connection with a global partner makes their work more real. As we move ahead in a new year, I hope that we can come up with ways to support them and share their struggles from Canada."

The tour played a crucial role in advancing our advocacy goals, strengthening relationships with partners, and affirming the value of the WPS program to communities, Parliamentarians and broader networks.

KAIROS and For the Love of Creation sent global delegation to 2022 climate conference

KAIROS and For the Love of Creation (FLC) sent ten delegates to the United Nations Conference on Climate Change (COP27) in Sharm el-Sheikh, Egypt, November 6-20, 2022.

The delegation included **KAIROS' Women of Courage: Women, Peace and Security** partner organizations from Colombia, DRC, Palestine and South Sudan, as well as Indigenous partners and youth from Canada. Together, they represented grassroots voices and called for the meaningful participation of Indigenous peoples and people from the Global South, especially women, in decision-making regarding climate change.

The delegation brought its messages to a side event that it co-sponsored with the Equality Fund at the Canadian Pavilion titled, **Global South Perspectives on Climate Justice, Peace & Conflict, and Gender Equality.**

Clifford Mushquash, Anishinaabe from Pawgwasheeng (Pays Plat First Nation) on the north shore of GichiGami (Lake Superior), helped facilitate the first-ever KAIROS Blanket Exercise at a climate COP.

KAIROS at UNCSW67

KAIROS' Cheryl McNamara joined Lucy Talgieh, the Women's Project Coordinator at Wi'am, in New York City for the UN 67th Session of the Commission on the Status (CSW) of Women in March 2023. They attended under the accreditation of ACT Alliance, a global faith-based coalition. CSW67's priority theme addressed the gendered digital divide.

"Most people do not think of cyberspace as a skewed void. The general impression is that it is open for all, and a place where you can find anyone and anything. I am here as a Palestinian to tell you, this is not my experience," wrote Lucy Talgieh.

2022 Climate Action Month

KAIROS Climate Action Month 2022 focused on decolonizing climate action. Throughout September, KAIROS and its Indigenous and global partners shared resources and reflections on this theme, and measures to ensure the equal and meaningful participation of Indigenous peoples and people from the Global South – especially women and racialized communities – in decision-making spaces pertaining to the climate crisis. We also introduced members of the KAIROS/FLC COP27 Delegation.

2023 Climate Action Weeks

KAIROS replaced Climate Action Month with Climate Action Weeks in 2023 to focus attention on this existential threat throughout the year.

KAIROS held three Climate Action Weeks in 2023, which followed the theme of Decolonizing Climate Action with specific focuses: June 5–11 (Centering Indigenous Ways of Knowing), September 18-24 (Keep the Oil in the Soil and Let Justice and Peace Flow) and November 13-19 (Centering Voices from the Global South). Climate Action Week aimed to motivate and

inspire a daily practice of climate action, and to nurture personal skills and other gifts in support of climate justice and reconciliation with Indigenous Peoples and the land. Each Climate Action Week featured an event, blogs and resources.

Addressing ecological debt through loss and damage report

In November 2023, during Climate Action Week and the lead up to COP28, KAIROS launched its report, **Addressing Ecological Debt – Equity and Justice for Climate-Related Loss and Damage**, which centers on the analyses and experience of partners in the Global South, and concludes with recommendations for the Canadian government and the international community. Empowering Temporary Foreign Workers During COVID-19 Project wrapped up

KAIROS' Empowering Temporary Foreign Workers (ETFW) During COVID-19 Project wrapped up on September 30, 2022, after receiving an extension in May that year.

The Project served more than 150,000 migrant workers in Ontario, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island. Funded by the Government of Canada's Temporary Foreign Worker Program, it used a community-coordinated approach to support workers during the pandemic by providing information and resources on safer work environments and community services.

KAIROS supported thousands of incoming migrant for Refugees' Fall workers at Toronto Pearson

In 2022, KAIROS continued to offer its Airport Services, which was launched in May 2021. KAIROS Airport Services staff provided welcome bags, information, and general assistance to arriving workers at Toronto Pearson International Airport. From April to September 2022, KAIROS staff served more than 2,700 workers. They also assisted departing workers with translation, directions, luggage, and requests for information.

Attending the Canadian Council 2023 Consultation

Leah Shifferaw, KAIROS' Migrant Justice Manager, and Barbara Mangwende, KAIROS' Director of Programs, travelled to Calgary to attend the Canadian Council for Refugees' Fall 2023 Consultation from November 16 to 18. Focused on Canada's immigration and refugee crisis, this gathering brought together refugees, migrant workers, activists, industry experts, and community leaders to network and explore the complexities of the issue, including how to foster understanding and compassion for refugees among the Canadian public.

Building movements advocacy at KAIROS

In 2022 and 2023, KAIROS tracked several federal private members bills on corporate accountability and tackling environmental racism. With Bill C-262, Canada would adopt mandatory human rights and environmental due diligence legislation. The passage of Bill C-263 would empower the Canadian Ombudsperson for Responsible Enterprise. KAIROS encouraged its network to write to Parliamentarians in support of these bills, using a campaign developed by the Canadian Network on Corporate Accountability, of which KAIROS is a long-time member.

Bill C-226, Canada's first environmental racism law, was reintroduced in the House of Commons in early 2022. It was based on another bill that made its way to the Senate but died on the order paper when the election was called in 2021. In June 2022, KAIROS joined several environmental organizations in signing a letter to the Parliamentary House Leaders, urging them to cooperate to expedite passage of the bill. In the months that followed, KAIROS worked with the Canadian Coalition for Environmental and Climate Justice to help advance its passage through the Senate.

Urging support for women peacebuilders in Canada's annual budgets

As in previous years, KAIROS encouraged its network to reach out to the Canadian government to increase its Overseas Development Assistance (ODA) with a priority on women-led grassroots organizations. We celebrated when Canada increased ODA in Budget 2022 and we joined other civil society organizations in expressing our deep disappointment when Canada decreased it by 15 percent the following year. During the Canadian WPS partner visit in the fall of 2023, we offered Parliamentarians compelling evidence of Canada's powerful investment in women peacebuilders.

Connecting the dots between the climate crisis and gendered-based violence

KAIROS amplified the 16 Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence (November 25-December 10) in 2022 and 2023 through our social media channels. In both years we called for an end to gender-based violence, while focusing on the gendered impacts of the climate crisis, and the vital role women and girls play in tackling climate change as a means of empowering themselves. In the fall of 2023, KAIROS closely monitored reports of the escalating violence between Hamas and Israel. We issued an ecumenical statement to the Prime Minister with member organizations: A Cry to End the Violence and to uphold the rights of all civilians to life and freedom from violence and discrimination. We urged him to do everything he could to support an immediate ceasefire and a negotiated solution to the spiraling conflict. We called on Canada to work with a renewed effort toward peace and justice that upholds the rights of both Palestinians and Israelis to life and freedom from violence and discrimination and an end to the occupation. 
